EASTER 2020

What an end to term - none of us ever expected such an unprecedented final week to the Easter term and as we continue into these very tricky times it is difficult to make plans for when we will all be back together again. We are however going to support home learning as effectively as we possibly can after the Easter break. As soon as the announcement was made by the Prime Minister that schools should be shut down to all pupils except the vulnerable and the children of key workers, the Link worked extremely hard to operate 'hub' schools which we could then staff sustainably into the future for these eligible children.

Teachers all prepared Learning Packs to cover the last missed week of learning which we hope you have enjoyed. Opening throughout the holidays has been an additional challenge for us, especially when numbers are low but geographically spread and staff are also self-isolating. As a result, we have reduced the number of 'hub' schools for this period and will review this after the holidays when we know the number of pupils we need to accommodate going into the summer term. It is our intention to ensure that every child that is eligible for and requires a place in school can access it. At this point I would like to thank all our staff for their continued dedication and ability to 'go the extra mile' in delivering this additional support. The children in school seem to be having a brilliant learning experience, using the outdoors while all learning together with no concern for which school they attend or the age-group with which they are normally part of. I am sure as a result of this, great new friendships will be formed.

After the Easter Holiday break we will be keeping in touch with families. Teachers will be contacting you to make sure you are all managing well and will be offering anything we can do to ensure life is as acceptable as possible given the current, ever changing position. Distance and online learning will continue to be a priority and we will endeavour to support children as best we can, which I am sure, given the staff we employ, will be highly effective! All schools were issued with a new mobile phone which Academy Heads will man throughout this period for emergency calls, you should have this number. Emails are a great way to contact your Head as this allows preparation for answering your questions or issues. We hope you will all remain safe over this period but please don't hesitate to call if you have any needs that we can help you with.

The Link Academy Trust want to support our families as effectively as they possibly can and so we have taken other actions that we hope will impact positively on you all. Mr Matthew, the Trust Business Manager, immediately got to work and ordered a huge amount of food from our catering suppliers to create hampers of basic food, for some of the families we know will be finding things particularly difficult in this tricky time. A team went out on a delivery round last Saturday, all organised by Matt. He has also organised deep cleans in all our schools as well as ongoing rigorous cleaning in the schools we are using to reassure you all that schools are safe for your children. We are also aware that while the cancellation of SATs is no great hardship, we do recognise that some children have worked really hard to do well are probably feeling a little disappointed that they cannot prove just how well they have done. I would like to make it clear to all our pupils that your teachers are fully aware of the effort you have all put in and the brilliant progress you have made, all I want to do is urge you to keep learning as it will really help you when you move on to your secondary school.

Also, obviously depending on how long we will need to remain in isolation, some of our Year 6 pupils are unlikely to be able to have their usual end of year celebrations and this too is a disappointment. If possible, and again depending on when we return to 'normal' school hours, we will try to set up a special day for year 6 pupils to enjoy the rites of passage afforded when they move up to 'big school'!



To ensure you still feel connected throughout this period of being at home together I have suggested you all take part in the Mrs D Challenge - it looks like this.

To keep you all busy and creative I am going to set a fortnightly challenge for all pupils in the Link Academy Trust. Broadhempston Primary School

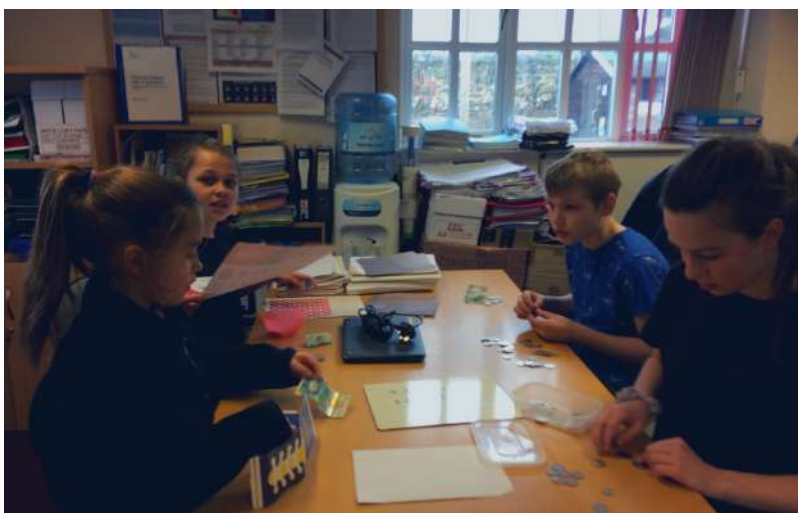

Diptford CofE Primary School

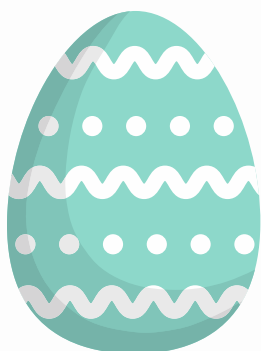

Drake's CofE Primary School

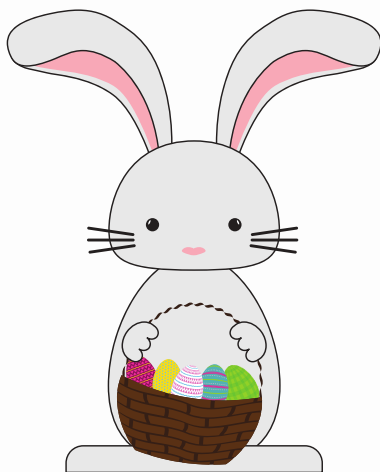

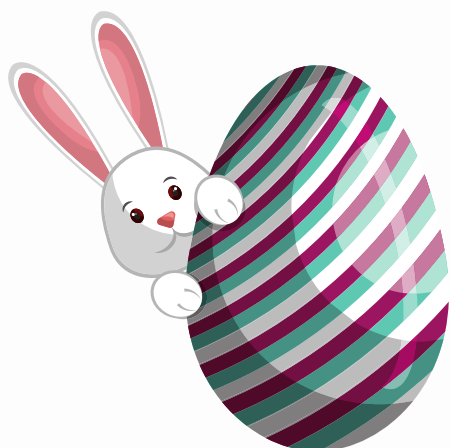

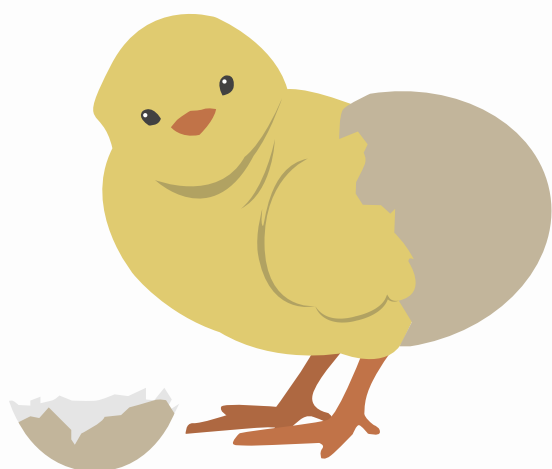

I'm really proud of all the children's achievement in sport this term and hope to see this continuing at Hennock as soon as we are all back together.

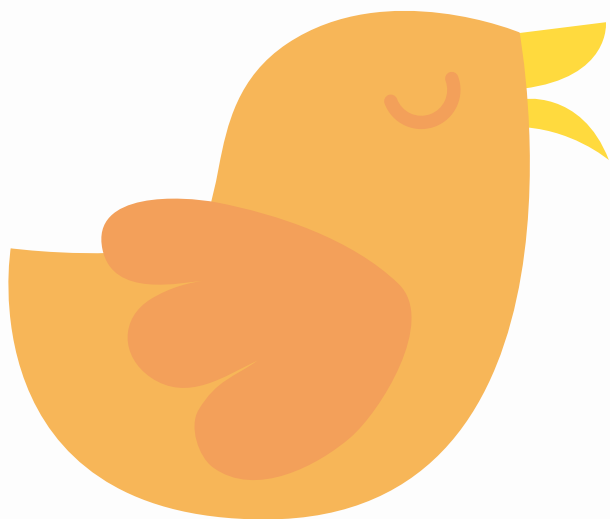


Ilseington CofE Primary School

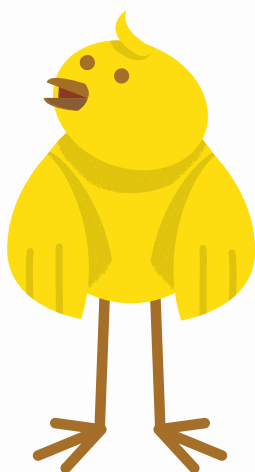
The children in Otters Class have been writing letters in their Literacy as part of their topic and they wrote a letter to the Queen and went into the village to post it. Let's hope they receive a response.

Widcombe Primary School

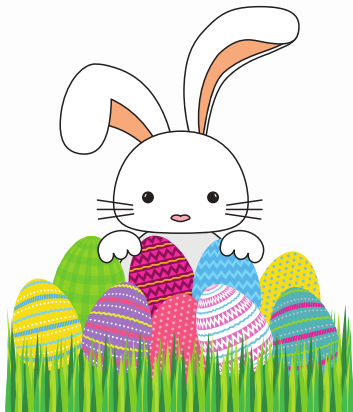

This term we have been learning to understand our climate and looking at the differences we can make. We had a workshop delivered by Devon Recycling and we have explored the world's resources and how we can conserve them. Every child in the school has been to a local conservation site and planted native trees to support local wildlife.

Through our topic, we have had a big focus on geography. Our Reception and Year 1 children were inspired by an information text about the Antarctic and created a penguin dance, which they performed in a dance sharing festival with five other schools. It was fantastic! They also put their map skills to the test with a great day out at Heatree learning to orienteer.

The older children have been looking at the geography of the planet and of the United Kingdom. They have been learning about counties, landmarks and physical features of the UK. By looking at contrasting locations around the world, the children have compared them to our own environment. On a class trip the children visited Belever to look more closely at our local physical geography and landmarks. They also looked at river systems and traced the River Dart back to its source. An outcome of their studies was to make a model of a river system, which they filled with water.

In Literacy, the class followed 'Shackleton's Journey' through the Antarctic pack ice and are planning an exhibition of writing and art inspired by the book.
